

VILLAGE ELECTRIC SUBSTATION COSTS LOWER THAN PROJECTIONS


The Village of Clinton Council held a special meeting on January 16, at 7 p.m. in the Clinton Village Office. The main purpose of the special meeting, it appeared, was to go into closed session to discuss the purchase of energy and capacity.

The Village Council received an update from Village Manager Kevin Cornish on the Electric Substation Cost and Fund Projection. The first projection of the cost from early last spring was \$1,401,755, and as of January 6, 2023, the updated projection is \$32,859 lower at \$1,368,896. Overall, the projection of the Electric Substation Cost and Fund Project has decreased by 2.5%.

"This is extremely good news for the Village of Clinton, considering costs are being driven up due to inflation and material availability," Cornish said.

The Village of Clinton passed a motion (6-0, Carl Habrick was absent) to authorize SSOE Group to prepare the Electric Cost of Service Study for a cost not to exceed \$12,300. Tom Fitzpatrick from SSOE has performed the Village's rate studies for decades, and this will probably be his last due to retirement. The previous study cost was about \$8,000. The \$4,300 increase is due to two factors: \$3,300 to clean up the historical data files and \$1,000 representing a 12.5% increase due to inflation.

CLINTON POLICE DEPARTMENT RECEIVES FREE RADAR SPEED SIGN

To help improve traffic safety, specifically the reduction of speeding motorists, the Clinton Police Department applied for a grant to receive a free speed measurement sign from All Traffic Solutions (ATS), a traffic safety company based in Chantilly, Virginia. The Police Department won the grant and received a speed measurement sign, along with a two year subscription of ATS Traffic Cloud software. The software program allows the Police Department to generate reports on traffic volumes and speed violations by time of day, making enforcement efforts more effective.

Neighboring communities have used speed measurement signs for several years, and have seen a drastic reduc-

tion in the number of speed violations. These signs retail for over \$4,000 each, therefore, this generous grant program called ATS Gives Back, allows this type of technology to be utilized by smaller municipalities that do not have large budgets.

In addition to providing the Clinton Police Department with the equipment, ATS also supports the sign through its warranty, and provides officers with free training to ensure we can get the most out of the device.

Thank you ATS for your generosity, and working with us to provide a safer community.

On January 16, 2023, the Clinton Community Schools Board of Education met to conduct their monthly regular meeting.

The district approved two separations of employment: preschool aide Maria Isabel DaSilva and high school social studies teacher Jaiden Crots. The Board approved the hiring of middle school social studies teacher Garrett Schermerhorn and high school social studies teacher Daniel Tomalak. Schermerhorn holds a Michigan Teaching Certificate with a Social Studies (RX) endorsement in grades 6 through 12, while Tomalak currently holds a Daily Substitute Permit, according to the Michigan Online Educator Certification System (MOECS).

Tomalak has a Bachelor's Degree from Defiance College with a major in social studies, the Local learned from

conversation with District Financial Director, Carol Wahl. Due to teacher shortages, the State of Michigan has expanded teacher certification regulations. Tomalak will need to pass the Michigan Test for Teacher Certification as his last step for a teaching certificate.

Students of CHS math and science teacher Ron Schaffner presented on their experience at the University of Toledo High School Engineering Competition. Twenty-one teams competed to build a robotic arm that simulated the removal of trash of various sizes and weights from a waterway into a recycling container. The Clinton High School team was composed of Anna Schaffner, Keegan Huston, Jacob Gilson, Caden Arntz and Jon Palecki. The team finished second. January 12, 2023 -- Washington, D.C.: Today, Congressman Tim Walberg (MI-05) voted in support of H.R. 22, the Protecting America's Strategic Petroleum Reserve from China Act, which passed the House by a vote of 331-97. This bipartisan bill, which Representative Walberg was an original cosponsor, prevents the Secretary of Energy from selling oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) to any entity associated with the Chinese Communist Party (CCP).

DONALD DEE THOMAS: MY LIFE STORY

WEATHERING THE DEPRESSION IN MY EARLY BUSINESS YEARS: The station needed renovation so I got the brickwork and masonry in good enough shape to open up. This time, we had room for a drive-through car wash. We combined washing cars for 29 cents with 7 gallons of gas. Customers had a choice of the car wash or a half-dozen glasses with each 7 gallon purchase. We had space for a good tire display and storage for new tires and for a battery shop, where we rebuilt batteries.

We kept the place open 24 hours a day and drew lots of business through the car wash, grease jobs and lubricating jobs. We learned how to manage it smoothly, adding shock absorber repair, oil changes and transmission repair. We charged batteries and sold rebuilt batteries, a profitable part of our business. We had a Goodrich budget department and a credit department. At one time, Nellie had an ice cream stand at the station, a good money-maker in the summer. All of these things made money.

Help was very cheap. That year, around 1932, 5,000 hungry unemployed people marched to the Rouge plant for work or bread. They met tear gas and machine gun fire that killed several of them. Ten thousand came to their funerals.

In JV action, boys lost to Onsted but bounced back with a win over Dundee!



January 16, 2023: The Clinton Redwolves hosted the Hudson Tigers and came away with wins from the girls, varsity boys and JV boys.



BETTY LAMPS

Think how difficult it was before 1800, when you had to have light to work at night and there were only candles or several kinds of oil lamps. By the 1850s, it was easier. There were kerosene lamps, gas lamps and finally electric lamps.

The Betty lamp is one of the earliest portable light sources. It usually is made of brass or iron. The bottom layer is a pan that shapes to a point: the spout. A second pan is on top to hold the wick, usually a twisted piece of fabric placed in the spout to soak up some fuel. The lamp also has a hook so it can be hung on a wall.

Antique Betty lamps are sold in many auctions for \$40 to about \$150. A wrought iron, copper and brass Betty lamp sold at a recent Hess auction for \$2,000 after 21 bids. It was made by craftsman Peter Derr of Pennsylvania (1793-1868), making it a prize for a collector. A new, reproduced Betty lamp sells for about \$40 to \$100.

* * *

Q: We have a set of 12 Lenox dinner plates, each depicting a different sailing ship. They are gold-rimmed and marked with the name of the ship and a description. Eight plates depict a Challenge Cup and year, and four are Cup Defenders. They have the Lenox mark and "J. McD. & S. Co." What is this mark? Are the plates valuable?

A: Sets of plates picturing yachts sailing in the America's Cup races were made by Lenox in different versions and sold by several companies in the 1930s. The mark with the initials on your plates was used by Jones, McDuffee & Stratton Co., a dealer and distributor in Boston that began working under that name in 1871. By 1910, it was the largest wholesaler and retailer of china and glassware in the U.S. The company sold commemorative plates for Lenox and other companies until about 1960. The border, signature or provenance can add value. Some sets have sold at auction for over \$1,000.

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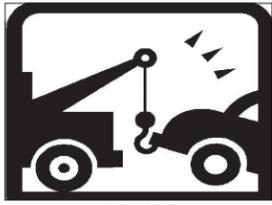

STURDY ACTION VEHICLE TAKES FLIGHT

A film destined to become one of TNT's greatest hits, the Gerard Butler led action vehicle aptly named "Plane," isn't as generic or outlandish as the title may suggest. It's actually a sturdy, taut, and crafty little thriller that knows exactly where to steer, er, land. The simplistic premise sits somewhere in the realm of "No Escape" meets "Air Force One," with a game Butler (alongside Mike Colter) who doesn't oversell the material. There's plenty of loose ends and unanswered questions, but questioning the logic or trying to make sense of the situation will prove futile. Turn your brain off and enjoy the ride.

Butler, headlining another entry in a long list of his latest B-movie action pictures, stars as Brodie Torrance, a pilot trying to make it home and see his daughter for New Years. First, he'll have to captain a leg from Singapore to Tokyo with a skeleton crew and 14 passengers onboard,

I appreciate how "Plane" and Director Jean Francois Richet, working with a script by Charles Cumming and J.P. Davis, keeps the movie grounded and authentic. You believe Brodie and Louis could stand toe-to-toe with these baddies because of their military and criminal background. And you also root for them every step of the way, which is the key ingredient for any low budget action film of this caliber. Don't go looking for details that aren't there. (The details of the charges against Louis are never revealed, nor do we learn how Brodie's wife passed away three years prior.) "Plane" doesn't have time for that; it wants brawls and suspense, which offer an escape on the big screen.

Or on late night cable, where your dad will be raving about it for weeks.




